DIRECTOR'S NOTE

In the theatre world, it seems we all have our own *Our Town* story. This isn't surprising, of course, considering *Our Town*'s status as one of the most widely performed plays of all time. In fact, there is a production of *Our Town* happening every day of the year, somewhere in the world.

My story with this play began in 1996, when my older sister Elizabeth played Mrs. Webb in our local high school production. Decades later, I still remember this production vividly. It was the first time I realized that a play could make me *feel* something. This beautiful, seemingly simple play, absent of spectacle, made me *feel*. I didn't have the words then to articulate what I experienced, but I know that seeing the show changed me. Six years later, I got to act in the play myself, in the role of Mr. Webb. I don't remember much about that production (aside from being jealous that my friend Elise got the role of the Stage Manager), but I remember walking into the lobby to greet the audience after the show each night and marveling at how deeply this play had affected people.

Now, decades later, my *Our Town* story continues, and I am honored to direct this play that Edward Albee once called "the greatest American play ever written." Wilder reveals the extraordinary in the ordinary in *Our Town*. Through stripping away the props, the scenery, and the spectacle, Wilder invites us to bring Grover's Corners to life in our individual imaginations—to see ourselves in each of these characters, in each of these lives.

It is particularly fitting that this play, which celebrates the importance of being part of a community, is a co-production between Monmouth College Theatre students and the children and adults of *our* town. In a time when so much in this world can make us feel broken, isolated, and lost, this production is a reminder of how strong we are when we are together. It is a reminder that we share something essential as human beings: a desire for connection, meaning, and a community to belong to.

Thank you for being a part of our community, a part of "our town."

DRAMATURG'S NOTE

Thornton Wilder's *Our Town* is the most produced play in America, holding prominence since its 1938 publication. The setup, which demands minimal set and almost no props, is simple enough to allow easy access for schools across the country, as well as repeat performances in professional spaces. But *Our Town* is an American classic for more than just its theatrical simplicity. In fact, to call *Our Town*, as a play 'simple' would be disingenuous. There are many reasons this story persists, but I believe one of the most important is something far deeper than theatrical ease and is rather something embedded in the characters and story itself. As the Stage Manager says to open Act 3, "something is eternal." One aspect of *Our Town* that remains eternal in the play and in our own world that it reflects is the sense of community. The play opens with the Stage Manager telling the audience who directed the show, who produced it, who is featured in it, establishing right away the communities required to put it on, before then delving into the fictional characters and spaces they inhabit. In our own production the entire cast enters the stage for the beginning, further blurring that line of connection; that of Grover's Corners and that of our own time. We follow the Gibbs and Webb families, but Wilder ensured the story didn't end there. The town that exists around them is what provides an anchor to the play as a whole. Even though Grover's Corners exists in a time we are not familiar with, there's so much the audience can see and know as their own: from the morning greetings of neighbors to falling in love for the first time, weddings and funerals and getting up early for school, your parents and your siblings and the people around you who make the world you live in what it is—all of that and more is explored in this story. This is where we find what makes this play persist. This is where we find that 'something' which is eternal.
